Angmering has always been a popular place to live, with evidence of human activity going back to Roman times.



The village of Angmering is located approx. 2 miles north of the English Channel in the county of West Sussex. It is situated roughly halfway between the towns of Worthing and Littlehampton which are both about 4 miles to the east and west respectively. The parish is about six miles long (from north to south) and two miles wide and covers some 1900 hectares. About two-thirds of the parish (mostly above the A27 road) fall within the South Downs National Park.

In 1976, Angmering was twinned with the Normandy town of Ouistreham-Riva-Bella, the location of WW2 'Sword Beach'.

AN OUTLINE OF ANGMERING

As you can see the Parish outline is shaped very much like a rabbit and we are sometimes referred to as the rabbit!

On this version the darker green colour shows where the Parish boundaries fall within the South Downs National Park.



PARISH BOUNDARIES

The south of the village borders with East Preston, and there can sometimes be confusion as to which Parish Council this area belongs to. Angmering has some postcode addresses showing as Littlehampton and East Preston, but these do not define the borders of the Parishes so therefore the area to the south between the A259 and the railway lines are within Angmering Parish Council. The map below shows the boundary line in dark blue. The shops in Downs Way are also within The Angmering boundaries.

This can be confusing but there is an easy way to find which Parish your residence falls under. Your council tax demand shows this by looking at the boxes that show how your demand is made up, it shows which council receives a part of this figure.

A HISTORY OF ANGMERING

The village of Angmering has a rich, long, and fascinating history. On Harrow Hill - in its extreme north - Neolithic Man mined flint for tools and weapons, a process that continued into the Bronze and Iron Ages and beyond. Evidence of settlements in and around the village from these periods have also been discovered in recent years.

The village itself grew as a result of its geographical position, its access to materials, and to the nature of the land which surrounded it. Access to water was critical and the Black Ditch stream which coursed through Angmering provided this, while timber, flint and clay for building materials were readily available. The land, which is mainly rich brickearth in the south and chalk in the north, were ideal for both arable and sheep/cattle farming. Being on relatively flat land in its south, Angmering was easily accessible from the ancient highways along the coastal plain while the river to the sea was once navigable up to southern parts of the parish and provided a further communication link.

Later, the Romans took advantage of these benefits, and evidence of their settlements have been found in numerous locations, the most notable being the substantial Roman villa and bathhouse near the parish's western boundary, and a smaller bathhouse on the slopes of Highdown - a Bronze Age settlement - to its east.

But it was not until the Saxons settled here that we can start to visualise a more permanent community. It is believed the name may have originated from a Saxon settler of status by the name of 'Angenmaer', the addition of 'ing' meaning 'the people of'. Its first mention comes in the 9thC when Alfred the Great granted 'Angmerengatum' to his kinsman Osferthe.

With the Norman occupation and settlement of Britain, a system of manors evolved, and the 1086 Domesday Survey records the village as being divided into the two principal manors of 'Angenmare' (possibly East and West). These were later subdivided to include Ecclesden and Ham.

Angmering once comprised three parishes, namely, East and West Angmering in the south, and Barpham (or Bargham) in the north. All three were combined into one at the time of the 16thC Reformation as, by that time, the Saxon-founded churches of East Angmering and Barpham had fallen into ruin. Only the late-12thC Norman church of West Angmering remains today - St Margaret's.

Angmering was at one time considered a small market town – granted a Charter by King Richard II in 1384 – and until c1830 was the location of an annual district hiring fair for securing the services of labourers and shepherds. The consequences of the Charter undoubtedly helped Angmering grow in importance.

Within its Conservation Area, Angmering is fortunate to have several houses with medieval and Tudor origins that have survived, and which are protected as Listed Buildings, as are many others from the Georgian and Victorian eras. The early-18thC Longback Cottages in Arundel Road, built originally as poorhouses for the aged and infirm, remind us that social responsibilities are not altogether a modern happening.

One of the earliest village schools in Sussex was established in Angmering. In 1682, a village yeoman, William Older, bequeathed money for the building of a school and, although rebuilt in the mid-19thC, it remained the principal education institution until 1965 when a new primary school was built in Arundel Road. Later, the old building was put to use as the village library. A smaller Roman Catholic primary school opened in 1872, and a large Comprehensive secondary school was constructed in 1975 in the south of the parish.

The railway came to Angmering's southern boundary in 1846. This allowed greater movement of the population and easier export of produce. The produce largely came from a market gardening industry which was started in the mid-19thC and developed to serve the emerging local seaside resorts, and the needs of cities such as London and Birmingham. However, cheaper foreign imports in the 1950s/1960s saw that industry go into steep decline.

The demand for more houses and improvement in living conditions saw a steadily rising parish population through the 20thC, which accelerated further in the last 20 or more years. With a population of 708 in 1801, 1022 in 1901, 5812 in 2001, the number now exceeds 10,000 which presents challenges for Angmering and its infrastructure. Notwithstanding this, the village centre retains its rural charm and attractiveness, largely through the preservation of its old and ancient buildings, and the spirit of the Angmering community in ensuring this.

HOW IT WORKS

You send in your report using the free mobile app, a text or picture message or using the web site. Love West Sussex will deal with your report and you will be kept informed of progress by using the web site, or they will send you a message when it's complete.

To get the app you first need to download the **Love Clean Streets app**, you then tailor your app to where you are in the country. So in this case you need to choose Love West Sussex.

ANGMERING PARISH COUNCIL

YOUR COUNCIL

Angmering Parish Council is the parish authority for the village of Angmering and has a population of approximately 10,000. The Council office is located in the village centre opposite the Lamb Pub. It provides a wide range of information and the staff are always happy to help.

COUNCILLORS

The Parish Council comprises of 13 Councillors who represent 2 wards with elections held every four years. Councillors are always open to discussion with residents and if you have an issue in your area, they would be more than happy to talk to you. ALLOTMENTS - HONEY LANE

There is currently 1 site in Angmering with approximately 130 plots and Angmering Parish Council have a Community Allotment there. If you would like to volunteer for the Community Allotment please contact the parish office for details of how to get involved.

HISTORY

The allotment site in Honey Lane has been in existence at least as long ago as the Second World War and is the last remaining allotment site in the parish of Angmering. In 1990 the Angmering Allotment Association was formed to run the site on behalf of the Angmering Parish Council. The site, which is now surrounded on all sides by houses, is approximately four acres, and has 130 plots of varying sizes, the remaining space being taken up by a store and car park. There is a metered water supply and some eight water troughs around the site.

As it is a very old allotment site the plots are a variety of sizes measured in the old way of rods.

- A full plot is 10 rods which is equivalent to a basketball sized court.
- Half plots are 5 rods and are obviously half this size and then there are border starter plots which are much smaller.

Costs:

Full plot	£25 pa
Half plot	£15 pa
Border plots	£10 pa

RECYCLING, RUBBISH AND DOG WASTE

Arun District Council are responsible for waste management including collections for recycling and rubbish. You can find out when your collection day is, arrange collection of large bulky items and report missed collections by visiting their website:

GREEN WASTE CLUB

A chargeable garden waste collection service is available to Arun residents (if you live in Angmering then you are an Arun resident). Members of the Green Waste Club will receive a fortnightly collection of their garden waste and the hire of a wheelie bin for this purpose. All waste collected is composted at a local facility and used in the Earth Cycle compost range. This service is provided on behalf of Arun District Council by Biffa. Garden waste can also be taken directly to your local household waste recycling centre.

DOG WASTE

Angmering Parish Council are supporting the Pooper Snooper App that lets you highlight the problem of dog fouling wherever you are and puts dog fouling on the map! The app allows you to record and find the location of bins so that it's easier than ever to find where to dispose of your doggy deposits. All the dog waste bins in Angmering have been loaded onto the app to help you find your nearest dog waste bin. This is what the app looks like:

VILLAGE SQUARE

There is car parking available, some offering 1 hour's free parking while some spaces allow you to stay all day. There's a handy map at the end of this guide to help you find your way around.

If you go further afield you will find lots of shopping and eating opportunities in East Preston and Rustington.

Every Friday in Littlehampton you will find a weekly market (9am-3pm) in the High Street where you can visit many stalls including men's clothing and household essentials. Between April to September there is also a spectacular Artisan Market on the first Saturday of the month where you will meet some of Littlehampton's most talented artists and craftspeople.

ANGMERING LIBRARY

Located on Arundel Road opposite St Margaret's Church in the centre of the village, the Library has a wide range of books as well as useful information and hosts many group activities.

The Library has free wi-fi, internet access and public PCs are available to library members and non-members. There is also a photocopier, study space, fax service and scanner. All of this in addition to an eLibrary offering online access to free eBooks, eAudio, eNewspapers, eMagazines as well as websites that can help with family history or job seeking.

The building has full disabled accessibility and toilet, unfortunately there is no parking available.

The building was originally the village school and was constructed in 1844. In 1966 the school moved to a new location in Arundel Road and, after 8 years of uncertainty, the building was purchased by West Sussex County Council in 1974 for conversion into a library.

BEACH LIFE

The beach closest to Angmering is located in **East Preston**, it has groynes and is mainly pebbles with compact sand at mid to low tide. This is a standard beach for this West Sussex coast stretch, although due to difficult access the beach tends to be used only by the locals. By difficult we mean being able to park so if you live in the village and are to walk you should find it fairly empty most of the year compared to other beaches in the area.

The area surrounding the beach is very similar to areas west of Littlehampton towards Bognor Regis, like Middleton-on-Sea, where houses and private estates back directly onto a pebble beach.

Popular sailing location with a sailing club on the beach and a small beach kiosk by the club and a cafe 100yds back up the road.

Limited parking due to the private estates backing onto the beach, which means you have two parking choices, the village or the sailing club. Some of the roads have daytime parking restrictions in the summer or require residents permits.

The beach is only just down the road from Angmering village centre with cafes, more parking, pubs and some shops.

LITTLEHAMPTON BOASTS TWO STUNNING BEACHES

EAST BEACH

East Beach is an award winning, family friendly sand and pebble beach which is over a mile long. You can stroll along the promenade, sit on Britain's longest bench and admire the view or take a dip in the sea. The sand is perfect for sandcastles and when the sea goes out you can explore the tide pools for underwater creatures.

East Beach is bordered by large seafront greens with picnic areas with barbecue units. This area hosts various events throughout the year including the annual Sandcastle Competition in the summer holidays.

Also located on East Beach is the award-winning Stage by the Sea, a unique performance stage used throughout the year for a variety of entertainment including Punch & Judy Shows, band performances and the annual arts festival. It is free to hire and more details can be found online:

The beach is patrolled by RNLI Lifeguards throughout the summer season and Kidcare wristbands are available for children.


There are three Pay & Display car parks on the seafront.

Dogs are restricted to the area East of Norfolk Road between the 1st May to 30th September (summer season). During the rest of the year, they are allowed on the beach. Dog fouling penalties can still be enforced so pick it up and bin it!

WEST BEACH

A site of special scientific interest West Beach is home to one of only 3 sand dune systems in West Sussex. Well known for its laid-back atmosphere West Beach is a great spot to relax with a picnic, on clear days you can enjoy views of neighbouring Bognor Regis and even the Isle of Wight.

West Beach can be accessed by car or by foot across the red bridge opposite the railway station. From the bridge it is a 15-minute walk along the river. West Beach is also home to the award-winning West Beach Café, the ruins of the Littlehampton Napoleonic Fort and if you look hard enough you might find some fossils. There is a small pay & display car park and public toilets.



RIVER LIFE

The River Arun is close to Angmering, in fact Littlehampton lies at the mouth of the river.

The river was once home to a busy shipbuilding industry but now offers a slower pace of life as a popular leisure marina.

Visitors and locals alike enjoy walking alongside the river, taking in the beautiful views and watching the boats sail by. From the Littlehampton end you can sample the catch of the day in one of local restaurants including traditional Fish and Chips, contemporary British, Thai and Indian cuisine.

The riverside is also a great spot for crabbing, you can buy all the equipment needed from the souvenir shops along the river or at the Harbour Park. If you would rather be out on the water, you can take a trip on the river ferry which takes you to West Beach or book on one of the many charter boats that offer deep sea fishing trips.

WALKING & CYCLING

Angmering is on the edge of the South Downs National Park and there are many opportunities for rambling in the countryside nearby. The South Downs site gives all the necessary information to plan your walks safely: www.southdowns.gov.uk

The northern part of Angmering, north of the A27, is principally woodland criss-crossed with paths providing excellent and attractive walking facilities throughout the year. Even further north, the woodland gives way to downland and the most northerly tip of the parish, Chantry Post, is situated on the South Downs Way.

All these walks start from the village centre but could be considerably shortened by parking near The Woodman Arms (currently closed) or The Fox public houses.

Walk 2 (Parkland Walk) 5.5 miles

Walk 3 (Woodland Walk) 7 miles
